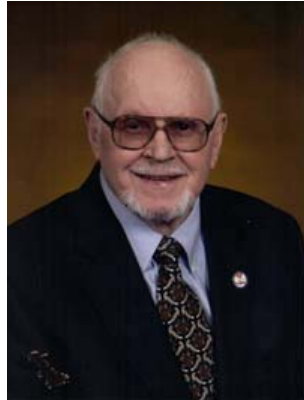

## F. MEMOIRS OF DECEASED CLERGY AND DIACONAL MINISTERS

### DANIEL EDWIN BAILEY July 13, 1924 – April 16, 2006



Daniel Edwin Bailey was born in Eagle Springs, in Moore County, North Carolina, on July 13, 1924, to Lillie Hazel Staley and The Reverend Dr. Addison Bailey. He joined the Palestine Methodist Church, on the New London Circuit, and became a member in elementary school.

His dad's next appointment was to the Liberty Circuit, where he went to high school and graduated after the 11<sup>th</sup> grade. This would later become his first appointment. He liked to tell us that the kids from high school waited until he got up to preach and filed in and sat on the back row, to see if he could really do it.

He was in the First Division of the Marine Corps. After a bloody battle trying to get on the island of Peleliu in the Pacific, his sergeant ordered him to have Divine Service the next morning, since it was Sunday and they did not have a chaplain. By the flairs from the big guns that night, he read from a book by Bishop Cushman that he had in his backpack. The next morning, he had a service for the outfit. Later, lying in a foxhole wounded, several of the dying men wanted him to give them the last rites. He announced that he wanted to be a minister after returning from active duty in the Marines during World War II (1942-1945). He was honored with a Purple Heart, Presidential Citation, and Sharpshooter Medal.

After the death of his father, his family moved to Albemarle, where he met Mildred Louise Crayton. They were married on April 8, 1944, and would have five children. The eldest, Thomas Edwin, died as an infant, September 7-8, 1946. These survive: Daniel Edwin Bailey, Jr. (Sharon), born on October 10, 1948; Dr. Ruth Elizabeth Bailey, born on July 13, 1953; Janis Louise Bailey Laws (Jim), born on December 31, 1955; and Lisa Hazel Bailey Corbitt (Chris), born on June 26, 1959.

He graduated from Pfeiffer College (A.A., 1948), Catawba College (B.A., 1950) and Duke Divinity School (B.D., 1954). He was licensed to preach in 1945 and admitted to the Western North Carolina Conference on trial in 1950. Admission in full connection and ordination as deacon followed in 1952, and he was ordained elder in 1953. In 1975, Catawba College honored him with the honorary degree of doctor of divinity.

He served the Liberty Circuit, 1946-47; New London Circuit, 1947-50; Bethany (Salisbury District), 1950-54; Trinity (Charlotte District), 1954-57; Charlotte: Hickory Grove, 1957-61; Reidsville: Main Street, 1961-65; Mount Airy: Central, 1965-69; Salisbury: First, 1969-73; Winston-Salem/Northeast District Superintendent, 1973-74; Winston-Salem/Forsyth District Superintendent, 1974-75; and Winston-Salem District Superintendent, 1976-79. During a leave of absence (1979-81, he worked as a psychotherapist, leading group therapy sessions and weekend retreats for growth and change. He then returned to active ministry and served Randall, 1982-84, and Gray's Chapel, 1984-1988. It was at Gray's Chapel that he met Dora Kathryn Thomas Kidd, and, on July 12, 1987, they were married. Brian Thomas Kidd became his stepson, and there was an instant bond. He retired in 1988.

He was a member of the American Rose Society and enjoyed growing and exhibiting roses. In 1992, he rooted a sport from a "Gene Boerner" floribunda bush and created a new rose he named, "Kathryn Bailey," now registered with the ARS.

He served as a horticulture judge in many local, district, and national shows. He served as the chaplain and wrote the chaplain's column for the Carolina District newsletter. He was presented the Outstanding Judge of the Year award for the Carolina District of the American Rose Society in 2005.

In the 1999 *American Rose Annual* magazine, a four-page article was published about him, in which he shared this:

I grew up as a preacher's kid, and during the Depression we depended on gardening for a lot of our food. My parents made gardening fun, so I have always loved working in the garden. After World War II, I came out of the Marines and entered the United Methodist ministry. I was on the move and often worked seven days a week. There was no time for digging in the soil and growing plants. I have been trying to catch up on all the digging and growing of things I missed all those years. I searched for and imported exhibition roses and many times propagated them myself. People started calling me 'The Rose Man.'

"The Rose Man" left his earthly shell on Easter morning, April 16, 2006, at 3:46 A.M., to join his mother and father, Lillie and Addison Bailey; his sister, Nina Jean Bailey Tice; his brother, Maynard Sheldon Bailey; his son, Thomas Edwin Bailey; and other loved ones at the ultimate Easter reunion. This was the reunion he had prepared his children for, the one that we had heard so much about the last ten years.

A memorial service was held at Gray's Chapel Church, in Franklinville, on April 20, 2006, with James G. Allred, Jr., and Jacqueline E. Tookey officiating. His brother, The Reverend Dewey Addison Bailey, spoke about Ed's decision to become a minister after returning from the war. He remembered being advised to always use his own personal experiences to create sermons.

Hardly a visit or conversation occurred that he didn't tell us about the reunion he would attend with Jean, Lillie, Sheldon and all the others waiting for his arrival. He never spoke of dying, only living. Dad's faith has always been my anchor. He believed with every fiber of his being that someday he would be called home to be with his Lord and his family. Because of his strength in faith, I know that someday I, too, will attend a reunion, and he will be out in front to welcome me home. That's a great gift he gave to those of us left to wait. He gave us serenity and peace, knowing he was where he longed to be. I can't wait to see him again and tell him thanks. *(Daniel Edwin Bailey, Jr.)*

Dad didn't have a green thumb; he had a green arm. Through the years, he planted many seeds, and a few of the seeds were located in his gardens. But, mostly, he planted seeds in people. He planted them in you and in me. He was also a gifted storyteller. I was a teenager before I realized ministers did not always tell stories when they preached sermons. He could place you in the middle of the action. When Dad told the story of the crucifixion, it was through the eyes of a soldier, walking up the hill with Jesus and standing at the foot of the cross. When he talked of his death, it was a homecoming and a celebration with his family. *(Lisa Hazel Bailey Corbitt)*

When people tell me that they are sorry that I lost my dad, I don't hesitate to tell them that I did not lose my dad. I know exactly where he is! His greatest legacy is the rock-solid faith he instilled in others. He never claimed to be a perfect man, only a man filled with faith. His last wishes were to donate his body to Duke Medical Center. His remains will be cremated and scattered in the garden he loved.

**ROBERT CALVIN BOGAN, SR.**  
**August 21, 1924 – October 9, 2005**



On August 21, 1924, in the southern city of Charlotte, North Carolina, a blue-eyed baby boy was born to Newton Calvin and Annie Bruton Bogan. They named him Robert Calvin. Robert had eight older siblings, and another was born three years after his arrival. He was thankful for his rich experiences growing up on the farm and living for 11 years in the Hezekiah Alexander House, presently on the grounds of Aldersgate United Methodist Retirement Community.

Robert was a U.S. Army veteran of World War II and was awarded the Bronze Star and Oak Leaf Cluster for actions during operations against the enemy on Luzon, Philippine Islands. He had previously received his first Bronze Star along the Ormoc Corridor in Leyte, Philippines, where he made two trips to rescue wounded in the face of enemy grenade attacks.

The steadfast praying of his saintly parents convicted him, and the Lord saved him when he was in a foxhole on June 1, 1945, in the Philippine Islands. Robert referred to his conversion date frequently and spoke of how God transformed his life on that day.

On March 14, 1946, he married the beautiful girl, Gladys Mae Warren, to whom his sister Ruth had introduced him. Their first child, a daughter they named Judy Lee, was born on December 15, 1947. A son, Robert Calvin, Jr., was born on April 28, 1949.

In 1958, following completion of a lengthy course of night study, Robert was ordained in the Wesleyan Methodist Church. Five years later, at 39 years of age, he fervently pursued his college education, while faithfully serving full-time pastorates. He graduated from John Wesley College, in High Point, North Carolina, with a bachelor of religious education degree in 1972. Robert, affectionately called "Pastor B" by his parishioners, served the Wesleyan Methodist Church for 18 years before transferring to The United Methodist Church. He completed four years of the United Methodist Course of Study at Duke University and the fifth year at Emory University.

Elected president of the Ministerial Association and appointed chaplain of the Civitan Club while serving the First Wesleyan Church in Eden, North Carolina, he accepted invitations from over 30 churches to be the evangelist for their revivals. One time, a man heard that he would be speaking at his friend's church and told him, "You had better get out some extra chairs! You won't be able to seat the people!"

While battling cancer, he found it difficult to preach on many Sundays, yet he fulfilled his duties with God's help. He loved preaching so much that he dreaded the day he would have to retire. His first appointment was to the Huntsville Circuit in 1972 for nine years (1972-81). He then served Indian Trail, 1981-86, and Charlotte: Moore's Chapel, 1986-89. Following one year at Maylo in Gastonia, 1989-90, he served the Beulah and Concord churches, in Bessemer City, from 1990 until 1994. Approaching 70, he realized that the dreaded day had come, and he retired in June 1994 after 40 years of ministry.

"Pastor B" was a lover of nature and received much joy in bird-watching and gardening during his retirement years. He also enjoyed building and flying model airplanes. He continued to serve churches in the Seagrove and Asheboro area. He faced every challenge, equipped with his favorite motto, "It can be done!" and savored his every breath from God. He believed in simple living and shared the philosophy of his favorite writer, Henry David Thoreau:

I went to the woods, because I wished to live deliberately, to front only the essential facts of life, and see if I could not learn what it had to teach, and not, when I came to die, discover that I had not lived.

In September 2004, he and Gladys moved to Boiling Spring Lakes, near Southport, to be near their daughter, Judy, and their three grandchildren. His deteriorating health, due to mini-strokes and other complications, confined him to a rehabilitation center for two months. Robert's family decided to take him home. With Hospice care, he lived contentedly for almost two weeks prior to his home-going in the early hours of Sunday, October 9, 2005.

Robert's funeral was held at Trinity United Methodist Church, in Southport, North Carolina, on October 11, 2005. His son, Bob, an experienced speaker, shared some of his favorite times with his dad and his memories of growing up as a "preacher's kid." His daughter, Judy, read a poem she had written for him. Survivors not previously mentioned are: Bob's wife, Cathy, and their son, Kevin Scott; and Judy's children, Cassandra Lee, Larry Gene, Jr., and Andrew Calvin Auman. Burial was on October 12 in Sharon Memorial Park, Charlotte. His brother, Clyde, also a minister, officiated at the service of committal. Clyde's great-grandchild, three-year-old Anna Lee Robinson, volunteered to sing for the family. It was so fitting that she sang for Robert's final service, since he especially loved young children.

Robert's family mourns his loss and will continue his legacy of living simply and supporting the church and its mission through sacrificial giving. He enjoyed doing for others anonymously and loved to help young children in need. He did, indeed, live deliberately.

**MAX WADE DULIN**  
**November 4, 1932 – October 16, 2005**



Max Wade Dulin, son of Rev. Grady Nicholson and Clara Abercrombie Dulin, was born in Waynesville, North Carolina, on November 4, 1932, the youngest of four children. He died on August 16, 2005, in Asheboro. At his request, there was no formal funeral service. On October 11, 2005, his family and friends met for a brief committal service at Wildcat Rock, on the Blue Ridge Parkway, where, according to long-standing instructions, his ashes were scattered. It is a place he loved to visit.

Max's early life was typical of that of parsonage children. He often spoke of the various places the family had lived, developing life-long relationships along the way. He finished high school at Reeds, in Davidson County, in 1951 and continued his education at High Point College, now University (B.A., 1955), and the Course of Study School at Duke Divinity School.

While a student at High Point, Max made the decision to enter the ministry and was licensed to preach on May 11, 1954. As a student, he served Grace Chapel, in the Statesville District, 1956-57. He was admitted on trial to the North Carolina Conference of The Methodist Church in 1957 and served several appointments

in eastern North Carolina before transferring to his home conference in 1968. His appointments included West Rowan, 1968-69; Palmyra-Hickory Grove, 1969-70; Mt. Carmel (Northeast District), 1970-74; Concord-Hopewell (Statesville District), 1974-75; Rutherford College: Abernethy Memorial, 1975-77; Lowell-McAdenville, 1977-79; Mount Airy: Rockford Street-Oak Grove, 1979-82; Greensboro: Proximity, 1982-84; Shiloh-Wesley Chapel, 1984-87; Mt. Shepherd-West Chapel, 1987-92; and Fairview (Lexington District), 1992-94. He retired in 1994 and served Asheboro: Legend Park during his first year of retirement. He also served briefly as associate at Flag Springs-New Hope in 1997.

Max met Mary Eggleston Perrow, a nurse from Alta-Vista, Virginia, while he was a student at Duke, and they were married by his father at Abernethy Memorial Church, Newton, on September 4, 1956. Their union was blessed by the birth of five children, Max Wade, Jr., on June 14, 1957; Michael Patrick, on July 14, 1958; Mary Kay, on June 8, 1960; James Perrow, on December 10, 1962; and Leeanna, on April 26, 1966. Mary's interest in and appreciation of his work, as well as her care for him through a long illness, demonstrate the character that she brought to their home.

In retirement, Max made his home in Asheboro, where he had a small workshop and continued practicing the skills of a gunsmith, which he had developed early in life. He did excellent work crafting flintlock rifles and reproductions of other early arms. He was quite knowledgeable on the subject, and his advice was sought out by collectors and historians. He had a love of history and was skilled in finding the seemingly forgotten events of an era. Once, during a Bible study, one of the participants asked, "Where in the Bible might I find the story of Jonah?" After pointing out that the story might be found in the book of Jonah, Max commemorated the event by placing lovely silver engravings on his next flintlock production, depicting Jonah going in and coming out of the mouth of the big fish. His sense of humor was superb.

As a minister's son, Max learned about church work at an early age. He knew the *Discipline* of the church and insisted that the churches he served work in that context. Mary commented that "he always wanted to do the right thing, even though it might be at personal expense." He had a grasp of the practical and was quick to point out possible solutions to problems throughout his ministry. His concern for people became evident when he would discuss the happenings in the congregation he was serving at the time.

Through his ministry, Max made a difference in our world. He was a friend to many, including this writer, who remembers him with great appreciation for his life and work.

**GARY LEROY FERRELL**  
**December 16, 1952 - June 21, 2005**



Gary Leroy Ferrell was born on December 16, 1952, against all odds, at Presbyterian Hospital, Charlotte, North Carolina, to Maurice E. and Margaret Shaw Ferrell. Three months into the pregnancy, the doctors encouraged his mother to have an abortion because of concern for her health. Against medical advice, his parents made a decision to trust God for the protection of both the mother and the unborn child, who was answer to prayer. Much like Samuel, Gary was dedicated to God's service by his mother before he was even conceived.

When he was in the second grade, Gary gave his heart to Jesus, and his life to God. He began to hear God's call to ministry when he was nine years old, not knowing that he had been dedicated before conception. Like Samuel, he did not immediately understand the true meaning of this call. Around the age of 17, however, it became clear to him. He did not know at that time all that this call to ministry would mean in his life, the challenges that it would bring, and the sacrifices that it would require, but he went into it like he did everything that he loved and for which he had a passion. Gary gave all.

Gary graduated from North Mecklenburg High School in 1971. He attended Methodist College, in Fayetteville, North Carolina, from 1971 to 1973. He then earned a B.A. degree from the University of North Carolina at Charlotte in 1975 and an M.Div. de-

gree from Duke University in 1982.

Gary preached his first sermon at his home church, Asbury United Methodist, at Huntersville, North Carolina. He was admitted to probationary membership in the Western North Carolina Conference and ordained deacon in 1982 and admitted to full connection and ordained elder in 1986. He faithfully served as pastor at Charlotte: Duncan Memorial, 1974-77; Greensboro: St. Paul, 1977-79; Table Rock, 1979-80; Locust-Oakboro, 1980-82; Oteen-Azalea, 1982-85; Concord: Ann Street, 1985-87; Coleridge, 1987-91; Cliffside-Providence-Avondale, 1991-92; South Rutherford Cooperative Ministries Co-Pastor, 1992-94; Toe Valley, 1994-96; Sharon (Gastonia District), 1996-2000; Stony Hill, 2000-02; Lewisville: Harmony Grove-Sharon, 2002-03; and Plateau-Wesley's Chapel, 2003-05. At the time of his death on June 21, 2005, he had just been appointed to Shiloh-Wesley Chapel, at Troutman. The saying that "Some Gave All" is a true testimony of Gary Leroy Ferrell.

Gary not only gave all to the churches that he served, and the people to whom he ministered, but he also gave all to the conference and the denomination that he loved without hesitation. In that dedication, sacrifice, and commitment, he served beyond the local church in the following ways: From 1993 to 1995, he served as the editor of the newsletter of the conference Historical Society. In 1993, he spearheaded the reorganization of the society. From 1995 to 1998, he served as the annual conference archivist, researching and recording histories of churches within the conference and building a database that is still in use. Those who contact the archives for historical information about local churches benefit from Gary's dedicated service. Then, from 1999 to 2000, he served as president of the Historical Society.

Gary served on the staff of the Southeastern Jurisdiction for five years, as summer staff to its Vacation Retreat for Mentally Retarded Adults. He also served the general church through the Historical Society of The United Methodist Church. He was elected the first vice-chairman of the Local Church History Section, one of four sections in the society. In 1990, he was elected as the chairperson of that section and served in that capacity for five years. In addition, he was a member of the board of directors of the society from 1990 to 1997. From 2001 to 2002, he put his gifts of writing and editing to use again for the church as editor of *Historian's Digest*, the newsletter of the society. From 2000 to 2002, he served as treasurer of the society.

Gary Ferrell had a heart for God, his family, and his church, and he loved the people whom he served. From 1991 to 1993, he operated the Corner Ministries of Rutherford County, in addition to his regular duties as pastor of his appointment.

Gary and the Reverend Susan Walker were married on October 7, 2001, at Stony Point United Methodist Church, by Steven E. Phillippi. At the time of his death, Gary and Susan were living in Newton, North Carolina, where he was serving the Plateau-Wesley Chapel charge, in the Statesville District. They were preparing to move to the Shiloh-Wesley Chapel Charge in Troutman, North Carolina, also in the Statesville District.

In addition to his service as a pastor, Gary also served his community as a host father for students from numerous foreign countries, and he served his country as the archivist of the 34<sup>th</sup> Bomb Group of the 8<sup>th</sup> Air Force.

On June 21, 2005, two days following annual conference, the first day of summer, Gary fell asleep behind the wheel of his car and woke up in heaven, in the presence of angels and saints and the God he loved and served. His funeral service was held at First Church, Newton, on June 26, with Bishop J. Lawrence McCleskey, Steven E. Phillippi, and James H. Graves officiating. Gary was interred at the Hiddenite Cemetery in Hiddenite, North Carolina. His father, Maurice E. Ferrell, preceded him in death. His wife, Susan, and a combined family of six children and eleven grandchildren survive him. The children are: Donna M. Ferrell Ratcliff (born on November 11, 1974); Christa L. Ferrell Morehead (born on January 15, 1977); Laura E. Ferrell Proctor (born on January 16, 1981); Angela D. White Jolly; Amy Renee White Jones; and Danny William Curtis White. The

grandchildren are Quentin Ferrell and Kailey Ratcliff; Bianca, Brice, and Brenley Morehead; Christian White and Chelsi Jolly; Ethan Bruner; and Airen, Hannah, and Owen Jones. Also surviving Gary are his mother, Margaret Shaw Ferrell, and his brothers, Mark, Bill, Eddie, and Kenny Ferrell. Numerous aunts, uncles, nephews, and nieces also survive.

In 32 years of ministry, continually leading churches, Gary Ferrell never faltered in his call to serve God through The United Methodist Church. He did so with a passion and a love that led him to give all that he had. He was a faithful and loving husband to his wife, Susan, and a loving father. If he had a worldly pride and joy, it was in his many grandchildren, who love their "Grampy" dearly and miss him tremendously. Gary Ferrell loved God, family, church, and country, and he gave all.

**LUTHER COLLINS HARRIS**  
**June 23, 1917 – June 19, 2005**



Luther Collins Harris died on Father's Day, June 19, 2005, at the age of 87 at the Specialty Select Hospital in Forsyth Medical Center, Winston-Salem, North Carolina. His funeral service was held on June 22 at Tabernacle Church, in Randolph County, and was conducted by Karen H. Smith, Bonnie P. Harris, and his son-in-law, Steve D. Joyce. He was buried in Mt. Zion United Methodist Church Cemetery, in Randolph County.

Luther was born on June 23, 1917, in Davidson County, North Carolina, a son of William V. and Alma Lookabill Harris. He was a graduate of Davis-Townsend High School and the Course of Study School at Duke University. He worked with the United States Postal Service for 24 years until 1962, at which time he felt a call into the full time ministry in what was then The Methodist Church.

At the time of his call into full-time service, his district superintendent advised him not to give up his postal position for the smaller pastor's salary he would receive at a time when his youngest child was entering college. But he was so sure of God's call upon his life that he chose to cut loose from the safety of the harbor, and he launched forth into the deep. He had a deep conviction that, not only salvation, but also all we ever need spiritually can be found in Christ! One of his favorite sayings was, "Jesus is right for whatever is wrong in your life!" He simply wanted to bear faithful witness to this in the remaining years of his life, and his calm, loving personality was touched and used by the grace of God to make him a winsome witness for Christ throughout his ministry.

Luther was licensed to preach in December 1961. He was ordained deacon in 1964 and was admitted to the Western North Carolina Conference as an associate member in 1970. For over 23 years, he served 16 churches in the following appointments: Greensboro: Joyner Memorial, 1962-65; Mt. Hermon (in what is now the Northeast District), 1966-69; Morven, 1969-71; Parkway-Pine Grove, 1971-73; and Tabernacle (1973-79) and Fairview (1979-81), both in the Lexington District. Following a leave of absence in the 1981-82 conference year, he retired in 1982. During retirement, he was appointed to Mt. Zion, in the Lexington District, from 1994 to 1998. He moved often and served a good number of churches because he wanted to minister to as many churches as possible, having entered the ministry later in life.

On April 17, 1939, Luther and Thelma Kennedy were married, and to them were born two children: Carol Margaret, on March 2, 1946, and James Ronnie, on September 18, 1940. Thelma preceded Luther in death on March 29, 2000. They were a faithful team throughout his ministry years.

Luther married Ruby Delk on September 28, 2000, and they enjoyed five years together. She survives him, along with his son, James Ronnie, and his wife, Durinda, of Leicester; his daughter, Carol H. Joyce, and her husband, Steve D. Joyce, of Liberty; two step-sons, Adrian Delk, and his wife, Barbara, of Lake Lure, and Boyd Delk, and his wife, Elizabeth, of Lexington; two sisters, Willa Mae Lambeth, and her husband, Paul, of Thomasville, and Maxine Conrad, and her husband, Clyde, of Lexington; four grandchildren, Alex Butler, Mark Harris, Stephen Joyce, and Marnel Joyce Smith; four great-grandchildren, Kari Joyce, Walker Joyce, Carsen Smith, and Luther Smith; four step-grandchildren, Darin Delk, Detra Delk-Patrick, Penn Lundgren, and Ann McColl; and five step-great-grandchildren, Andrew and Sarah Lundgren, Claire and Ian Patrick, and Briggs Delk. Preceding Luther in death was one granddaughter, Connie Goode, and a sister, Virginia Page.

Luther had a good ministry wherever he served. In his retirement speech to the annual conference, he closed by saying that he moved forward, knowing that the best is yet to be. At the conclusion of my remarks at his funeral, I stated that I believed that Papa's (the name he was fondly called by his family) final message to us all would certainly be: "Jesus is right for whatever is wrong in your life, and remember—the best is yet to be!"

**ROY DEAN KELLY**  
**June 15, 1942 – December 31, 2005**

On June 15, 1942, in Rutherford County, North Carolina, God sent an angel to walk among us for 63 and a half years. His given name was Roy Dean Kelly; I called him "Daddy." Daddy spent the first 19 years of his life in Caroleen with his earthly parents, T. F. (now deceased) and Violet Hill Kelly. He attended local schools, and,

in September 1961, he met Mary Davidson. It was "love at first sight," and they were wed on December 9, 1961. Daddy and Mama were blessed with three children: Michael Dean, born on December 10, 1962; Denise Lynn, born on November 14, 1964; and Eric Scott, born on July 9, 1969. Daddy held various jobs in these early years of marriage as they struggled as do most couples with three small children.

In 1971, God sent Rev. George A. Carnwright, now deceased, into the lives of my parents. When Daddy accepted God into his life, he joined Kistler's Chapel United Methodist Church. It was not very long afterward that he realized that God had sent him there for a very special reason: He was to minister to God's children and lead them down the road to Christ. He accepted his calling and received his license to preach in January 1974. He worked as a lay pastor for several years, working two full-time jobs, going to school at night, and raising three children. He received his A.A. degree from Isothermal Community College and his B.A. degree from Wofford College. He also earned Course of Study and continuing education credits from Duke University. He was ordained deacon in 1976, admitted to the Western North Carolina Conference as an associate member in 1982, admitted to probationary membership in 1984, and ordained elder and elected to full connection in 1987.



Daddy's first appointment (1974-78) was to Mill Spring, North Carolina, where, on the Mill Spring charge, he served Bethlehem, Gray's Chapel, and Lebanon churches. From 1978 to 1982, he served as pastor of the New Hope charge (Blackwater, Sanford, and New Hope), at Pilot Mountain. He moved in 1982 to Cliffside and was pastor of the Cliffside-Providence-Avondale charge until 1984, when he moved to Lincolnton to be pastor at Laboratory-Lander's Chapel (1984-89). The Union Grove-Olin charge at Union Grove was his next appointment (1989-92). He was appointed in 1992 to Hickory, where he was pastor at Fairgrove-St. John's until 1997. His final pastoral service was rendered at Shiloh Church, in Catawba County, from 1997 until 2005.

In May 2005, Daddy received the news that he had terminal pancreatic cancer that had already spread to his liver. He knew that his days were numbered, but never once did he say, "Why me?" When we would ask the inevitable question of, "Why you, Daddy?" he would always respond, "Why not me?" He took an incapacity leave in June 2005 because he felt he could not give his congregation the attention he felt they deserved. He then moved to Harmony, North Carolina, where he fought his battle with cancer and never once let his faith waiver. He said that God must be needing him to minister to some people with whom he

would not have otherwise come in contact. He was right. The nurse caring for him was a non-believer, but, on the morning that Daddy passed away, she started to come into the room and left. Shortly thereafter, she came back, with tears in her eyes. She told Mama that she could not get the door open all of the way because the room was so filled with angels. We have had numerous calls and cards from people he had met during his battle with cancer.

At Catawba Valley Medical Center in Hickory, God took his angel back home on the morning of December 31, 2005. A memorial service was held for Daddy on January 3, 2006, at Clarksbury Church, Harmony, where his body was laid to rest. The service was led by Allen P. Boliek, pastor, and three special friends who had gone into the ministry under Daddy's guidance: Stephen T. Johnson, Ronald D. Setzer, and Marsha E. Joyner.

Our entire family is now trying to deal with the loss of our best friend. The only comfort we have is knowing that we will see him again one day.

**WILLIAM RALPH KIMBALL, JR.**  
**September 14, 1948 – December 8, 2005**



William Ralph Kimball, Jr., better known as "Ron," was born in Tampa, Florida, on September 14, 1948, the firstborn son of the late William Ralph, Sr., and Kate Lee Boles Kimball. He is survived by his only sister, Twyla Ann Kimball, of Tampa, Florida, as well as by his wife, Joan Dorea Kraus Kimball, of High Point, North Carolina, whom he married on August 21, 1976; by his daughter, Rachel Kanielle, of High Point, born on July 1, 1979; and by his two sons, James William, of Falls Church, Virginia, born on December 21, 1980, and David Nathan, of High Point, born on May 5, 1984.

Ron's family heritage, rich in Christian faith and bathed with prayer, had a definite impact on his life and held partial claim as to why he accepted Christ as his own personal Savior. His great-grandfather, James Kimball, served as a chaplain in the Civil War for the Confederate army. Ron's desire to share the good news of Jesus Christ was largely shaped by family stories of faith passed on to him by his parents, as well as by his involvement in the teaching and music ministries of the church while he was growing up.

After graduating from H. B. Plant High School in Tampa in 1967,

Ron attended United Electronics Institute in Tampa and graduated in 1969 with an associate degree in electronics. He worked at Honeywell in Tampa for two years as an electronics technician, testing and repairing electronic military equipment. It was during this time that Ron received the Lord's call to enter the ministry. He spent the next four years at Clearwater Christian College, graduating in 1975 with a B.A. degree in biblical literature.

During his third year of college, Ron began attending Bayshore United Methodist Church in Tampa, where his calling to ministry was confirmed. He was actively involved with teaching in Sunday School, assisting in worship services, and singing in the choir. He continued his education at Eastern Baptist Theological Seminary in Wynnewood, Pennsylvania, where he received his M.Div. degree in 1979. While there, he accepted a position as part-time pastor at Fairless Hills United Methodist Church in Fairless Hills, Pennsylvania. He was licensed as a local pastor in 1979. Upon graduation, he was ordained deacon in 1982 and admitted to the Eastern Pennsylvania Conference as a probationary member. Election as a member in full connection and ordination as elder followed in 1984.

Ron's first appointment was to Fairless Hills, from 1979 to 1985. He then served Narberth Church, Narberth, Pennsylvania, from 1985 to 1989. In order to better oversee the care of his aging parents, he requested a transfer to the Western North Carolina Conference in 1989 and was appointed to the Oakdale-Vickrey charge, where he served from 1989 to 1995. He then served Hopewell Church, in the Albemarle District, from 1995 to 2000.

After a brief leave of absence, Ron began chaplaincy training in 2002 at Moses Cone Health System in Greensboro. In 2003, he was appointed as a resident chaplain there and completed seven units of clinical pastoral education. In 2005, he was appointed as an associate chaplain to High Point Regional Health System, in addition to work at Moses Cone.

Ron embraced all of life with passion, tempered with an understanding of God's grace as it had been poured out in his own life. He was passionate about his relationship with Jesus and committed to helping God's children mature in their own personal walks of faith. He freely shared the love of Christ, not only through the preached word, but also in deed, as he participated actively in numerous outreach programs at the various churches he served, as well as assisting as a summer counselor at Camp Innabah, in Pennsylvania. Most recently, he served as a volunteer for Hospice of the Piedmont, in High Point. He was also personally involved with the physical care of both his parents and his wife's parents.

Ron enjoyed spending time with his family. He and his wife were engaged in homeschooling their three children for approximately 15 years. Gardening was another of his passions. He enjoyed being a participant with God in the process of recreating life and beauty in his corner of the world. His integrity and steadfastness of faith are what mark his influence upon his family.

After a short illness, Ron was taken home by the Lord to be with Him on December 8, 2005, at High Point Regional Hospital. **LARRY LYNN LAMBETH**  
**January 2, 1929 – October 18, 2005**



Larry Lynn Lambeth was born in Guilford County, North Carolina, on January 2, 1929. He grew up in a loving home, the son of the late Clarence Sylvesta and Carolyn Hazel Crabtree Lambeth. In his teenage years, he was an active member of the youth group at West Market Street Church in Greensboro. During that time, he was strongly leaning toward what he discerned was a call to ministry, being encouraged by the youth pastor at the church; however, one of his God-given gifts, his distinctively articulate and engaging voice, led him to a job at a Greensboro radio station while still in high school. He gained a brief national spotlight in a news report on a visit to Greensboro of President Franklin D. Roosevelt during World War II.

He attended Guilford College for a year and a half. During summer months, he acted in plays presented by UNC-Greensboro at the playhouse in Burnsville. Thus, his broadcasting and acting career got a head start. During the Korean War, he served as a staff sergeant with the U.S. Air Force special operations, producing programs for the armed forces overseas. Returning to civilian life, Larry established himself as a freelance actor and voice-over professional, earning bit parts in films and commercials made in North Carolina and commercial training films.

He was doing the weather programs and acting in a children's special at WLOS-TV in Asheville when he met Anna Faye McNeill.

They were married on August 28, 1960. Their daughter, Laura Lesa (Bowman), now of Taylorsville, was born on April 30, 1962. Their son, Laird Lawrence, who is currently serving in the U.S. Army, stationed in Wisconsin, was born on September 1, 1963.

In the 1970's, Larry took a look at his broadcasting career journey and thought that there was something more for his life. His earlier encounter with a call to ministry as a youth at West Market Street in Greensboro returned in a clear and decisive imprint. He knew that this is the direction the rest of his life must take.

So, Larry began his ministerial career in 1979 with his appointment to the Todd charge, in the North Wilkesboro District, while a student at the Course of Study School. He continued to serve Todd as a lay pastor until he was assigned to the Hiddenite charge in 1983. He enrolled in classes at Appalachian State University and Greensboro College. In 1987, he was received into the conference as an associate member and ordained deacon, and in 1988 he was appointed pastor at Waxhaw, in the Albemarle District, where he served until 1993. His final appointment was to Homestead Church, in Charlotte, 1993-95. He retired in 1995, and he and his wife of 45 years moved to Newton. During his retirement, he served St. Paul Church in Newton for a brief period in early 2000. He also worked part time, for four years, on the staff at Newton: First as the minister of visitation for shut-ins.

Larry was born to communicate. His extensive background in that field made it all the more probable that those who listened to him speak, engaged him in conversation, and watched him act out the message would find fresh insights and new inspirations as he preached and taught and dramatized the Good News. He was an enchanting storyteller, in the best sense of the word. One of his favorite styles of presenting the Gospel to the congregation was his first-person narratives. During special seasons of the Christian year, he would "be" one of the Biblical characters in the scripture lesson and speak to the people first-hand. He thought of these moments as highlights of his preaching.

He was a doer. He had been in touch with the world. He had been in touch with good times and not-so-good times in his earlier career. He was compassionate and was especially concerned about those in the neighborhood who were hungry. He took the lead in the community and the church in setting an example. It was said of him that he was "generous to a fault."

His talents in his broadcasting career were also helpful in furthering the communications ministry of the annual conference during the 1980's. He was a member of the communications committee and an active participant in the television, video, training, and film projects of the conference.

In his last days, he was a victim of Alzheimer's disease and dementia. He died at home on October 18, 2005. A service of remembrance was held on October 20 at First Church, Newton, with the senior pastor, Daniel G. Martin, officiating.

**JOSEPH WILLIAMS LASLEY**  
**July 6, 1924 – May 20, 2005**



Joseph Williams Lasley was born on July 6, 1924, in Winston-Salem, North Carolina, to Joe Cephas and Dora Belle Williams Lasley. Two sisters, Barbara Lasley Carter and Doris Lasley Roddick, predeceased him. After graduating from Reynolds High School, he entered Brevard Junior College. His A.B. degree was earned from Guilford College in 1947 and the bachelor of divinity degree from Union Theological Seminary, in the City of New York, in 1950.

Joe enlisted in the army reserve of the United States in October 1943 and was called into active duty in April 1944. Following basic training, he was sent to Brooklyn Polytechnic Institute, New York, for a basic engineering course. Because of the need for infantrymen, he was assigned to an army rifle unit and became part of the 291<sup>st</sup> Infantry, 75<sup>th</sup> Division, and saw service in the European Theatre, Battle of Ardennes Forest. He received two Battle Stars, a Purple Heart medal, and a Bronze Star medal and received an honorable discharge on September 13, 1945.

Joe was nurtured in the Christian faith from early childhood by his parents and by caring church-school teachers in his home church, Centenary Methodist, Winston-Salem. He matured under the influence of Boy Scout leaders and professors at Brevard College and Guilford College. He had a great appreciation for the training and guidance of his seminary professors.

The call to the ministry came during his college days, and, following his undergraduate work, he completed seminary. He was admitted on trial and ordained a deacon in the Western North Carolina Conference in 1949 and into full connection in 1951, when he was ordained an elder. He served the following appointments: Student, Union Seminary, 1949-50; Charlotte: Moore's Chapel, 1950-53; Reidsville Circuit, 1953-56; Winston-Salem: Mount Carmel, 1956-60; Matthews, 1960-64; Winston-Salem: Union Ridge, 1964-68; Morning Star, 1968-72; Lake Junaluska: Long's Chapel, 1972-75; Tabernacle (Greensboro District), 1975-80; Murphy: First, 1980-84; and Asheville: Elkwood-Alexander Chapel, 1984-87. He entered into the retired relationship in 1987.

On June 11, 1949, Joe was married to Elizabeth Hare Lasley in the Somerton Friends Meeting House, Suffolk, Virginia, after the manner of Friends. Their children are George Wesley Lasley (married to Jane Mullen), of Raleigh, North Carolina, and Ellen Rebecca (married to Kevin D. Murphy), of Harpers Ferry, West Virginia. A step-grandson, John Mullen, lives in Benton City, Washington. Joe's family and friends will remember his loving care, his expressions of encouragement, his sense of humor and dry wit, and his gracious spirit.

Joe appreciated the Methodist Church and loved the people whom he served. He sought to encourage and strengthen them in the Christian faith. He faithfully proclaimed the gospel of Jesus Christ and visited those in

need. Joe was a stickler for following *The Book of Discipline*. He was a strong advocate for meticulous church records. He led nine different churches in building programs during his years of service. Perhaps the greatest tribute to his ministry can be seen in the growth that has transpired in so many of the churches that Joe served, both during and following his years of active service.

Joe developed a particular interest in the history of Methodism, especially that of the Western North Carolina Conference. He became a member of the Conference Historical Society's executive committee in 1957 and served in that capacity until 1968, when it became the Commission on Archives and History, which he served as chairperson from 1968 until 1992. He assisted the conference trustees in the planning of the present Conference Archives in Charlotte and in the planning and leadership of the special worship service at the 1990 session of the Western North Carolina Annual Conference, celebrating the 100<sup>th</sup> anniversary of this great conference. Joe continued as an ex-officio member of the conference Commission on Archives and History until 2000, having rendered 43 years of consecutive service on this conference agency. He also represented our annual conference on the Southeastern Jurisdiction Commission on Archives and History from 1988 until 1996, serving as the chairperson from 1992 until 1996. This position also made him an ex-officio member of the Southeastern Jurisdiction Administrative Council for those years. Joe was also privileged to serve on the General Commission on Archives and History from 1992 until 2000, serving as chairperson of the Landmarks and Shrines Committee from 1996 until 2000.

Joe Lasley was also an active part of the Southeastern Jurisdiction Historical Society, missing only one meeting of the society from 1968 to 1998. He served as treasurer of this organization from 1986 to 1990 and as editor of the society's newsletter from 1989 through 2000. In recognition of his many contributions to the society, he was elected an honorary member of the society in 1994.

For years, Joe Lasley provided effective leadership to our annual conference and to The United Methodist Church in the area of United Methodist history and was a valuable resource to countless people. Joe also served as a mentor to others, especially in the area of Methodist history, providing wise counsel, guidance, wisdom, and help to all who were interested in recording and preserving the history of our annual conference. Our entire conference will forever be indebted to him for his preservation of the stories of how God has been at work in the lives of the people called Methodist in western North Carolina.

Upon retirement in 1987, Joe's published writings included *Long's Chapel: A Centennial History; Names and Places: A Cyclopedia of Lake Junaluska*; and his autobiography, *Things Remembered*. His interest in the preservation of Methodist history continued, as evidenced by his support as an active volunteer with the Southeastern Jurisdiction Heritage Center as long as his health permitted.

Death came on May 20, 2005, at Brooks-Howell Home, Asheville, after a long battle with Parkinson's disease. A funeral service was held at Long's Chapel Church, Lake Junaluska, with Robert E. Fuquay, Jr., and this writer participating. Interment was in Forsyth Memorial Park, Winston-Salem, North Carolina.

#### **RALPH HERMAN NICHOLSON** July 21, 1915 – October 8, 2005



Ralph Herman Nicholson was our father. He was born on July 21, 1915, on a farm in Iredell County, North Carolina, and died quietly in the early morning hours of October 8, 2005, at Thomasville Medical Center, Thomasville. He was 90 years old when he died. Many, if not most, of his contemporaries in the conference had already passed away. He dealt with the painful death of our mother and stayed by the side of his second wife as she faded into a twilight of unresponsiveness. He dedicated the last years of his life to her care. He was a gentle man of God. His test was longevity and the loss it brings. We know that his faith in Christ's redemptive love never failed. We, his children, have the same confidence in the rock of his faith.

Herman married Hazel Elizabeth Montgomery on February 27, 1940, and to them we three were born: Garrel Herman, on December 24, 1947; Erick Monty, on August 16, 1949; and Melanie Vercile, on October 3, 1952. Our mother passed away on May 17, 1983, and our father married Sarah Montgomery Webb on March 24, 1984. She survived our father for just over four months, dying on February 21, 2006.

We grew up as a preacher's kids and knew a number of parsonages. It will come as no surprise to anyone that we had our conflicts. We can think of only a few times when our father lost his temper, but we can remember countless times when his patience and relentless energy found solutions to painful problems of the

soul. He found God's image in all his people, something that was not always easy for us to understand.

Herman was educated at Lenoir-Rhyne College (A.B., 1937) and Duke Divinity School (B.D., 1940). He was awarded the degree of doctor of divinity by Pfeiffer College (now University) in 1964 and served as a member of the board of trustees at both Pfeiffer and Brevard colleges. He served the conference as both a pastor and a district superintendent for more than 40 years and served as a navy chaplain in two wars.

He was licensed to preach in 1936, admitted on trial in the Western North Carolina Conference in 1941, ordained both deacon and elder in 1943, and admitted in full connection in 1946. His pastoral service began in 1936-37, when he supplied Mooresville: Jones Memorial. In the 1940-41 conference year, he served the Louis-

burg Circuit, in the North Carolina Conference. He served as a U.S. Navy chaplain from 1943 to 1945. He returned to Duke Divinity School in 1946-47, and then was appointed to Polkville, 1947-52. From 1952 to 1953, he was back in the navy during the Korean War. Conference year 1953-54 found the family at Shelby: Lafayette Street, followed by his appointment to Providence Church, Charlotte, 1954-57, in the early days of that church. We moved to Waynesville: First in 1957 and then to Herman's first post as a district superintendent, in Thomasville, in 1963. Asheville: Central was the next church, 1966-70, then back to Providence, in Charlotte, 1970-75. In 1975, it was back to the mountains, as Herman took his second post as district superintendent, in Asheville, 1975-76. His last appointment was to First Church, Salisbury, where he retired in 1981.

Our father grew up a child of the Depression, and, like so many of his generation, he never forgot the pain of hard times, the hard work needed, and the loving connections to family and friends. His life was bordered by his dedication to The United Methodist Church and to his family. This brings us to an important comment: We believe that, for all the right reasons, his loyalty to the conference and the church came first. It could have been no other way for him. He responded to God's call and the needs of the church. If we needed to move, we moved. If he needed to subdue his pride in some way, then it was quietly done. He never complained to any of us.

Herman loved to talk, and he liked to be the center of attention. Sound familiar? He loved to tell stories, and he loved to minister to those in need. We continue to hear from people who were touched by his care and his sense of humor. We have learned that it is really a great honor to hear the stories of his ministry. It is a very worthy kind of immortality, one which we believe to be a mirror of his gentle spirit, now with his Lord. We expect that he is still telling stories, and his brothers and sister are there with him, just as they were in that time long ago, on a small farm in Iredell County.

**THOMAS FOY PRICHARD**  
**May 8, 1912 – January 3, 2006**



Thomas Foy Prichard, known to his friends as "Brother Tom," was born in Hiddenite, North Carolina, on May 8, 1912, the third of 14 children. His parents, Minnie Ovella Little and Carl Linden Prichard, were both from Alexander County.

When Tom was three years old, his mother took him to visit a neighbor, who had a three-day-old daughter. Her name was Ruby Nellie Sloop. Tom got to hold the new baby and cried to take Ruby home with him. On July 20, 1932, he married Ruby, and, finally, was able to take her home with him. They were married for almost 74 years. They had two sons: the late Royal Worth Prichard, born on January 27, 1933, and Jerry Thomas Prichard, born on December 7, 1941; both lived in Hiddenite. Tom had five grandchildren: Roger, Jerry, Donnie, Dain, and Chad; and five great-grandchildren: Amber, Maia, Curtis, Mallory, and Lucas.

Tom always gave God 15% of everything God gave him. Tom and Ruby loved to travel. They would attend camp meetings all over the country. He was an avid photographer. He enlarged and did his own pictures back in the 1950s and 60s. He knew a lot about solar energy, which he called God's free energy.

Tom did not fly on airplanes, but said he would not be afraid on his trip to heaven. He spent many hours on his knees, talking to God. He never made decisions that were important without seeking God to lead him in the way he should go. He would not have traded places with the richest man in the world if he couldn't be a Christian.

Tom would spend many hours each week visiting sick people in hospitals and shut-ins at home. Dr. J. M. Robinson was sick in the hospital when he was in his 50s. He lived to be 98 and told everyone that Tom was the only preacher that ever visited him in the hospital or at his home. They became life-long friends. The doctor did not charge Tom to visit his office, either.

When he was seven years old, Tom got saved at Liberty Methodist Church. When he was 12, he felt God call him to preach. Tom walked to school with several other children. He had an altar along the dirt road, where he would have the children kneel down as he prayed for their souls. One of the children he prayed for, Rev. Clyde Warren, told me this story.

Tom attended Peoples Bible College, in Greensboro, from 1936 to 1939; Mitchell College, in Statesville, from 1957 to 1959; Davidson College, in Davidson, in 1960; Wake Forest University, in Winston Salem, in 1961; and Duke University, in Durham, from 1962 to 1963.

He was licensed to preach in 1952, was ordained deacon in 1955 and elder in 1979, was admitted on trial in the Western North Carolina Conference in 1955, and was received into full connection in 1959. His first appointment was to the Helton charge, 1952-55, followed by the Olin charge, 1955-59; the Elmwood charge, 1959-62; the South Davidson charge, 1962-65; the Giles Chapel-Charlotte charge, 1965-66; the Seagrove charge, 1966-69; the Rocky Springs charge, 1969-72; the Mountain Park-Grassy Creek charge, 1972-74; the Saint Paul charge, 1974-77; and the Todd charge, 1977-79. He retired in 1979 and, during the first year of his retirement, served Moravian Falls, 1979-80.

When Tom retired, Bishop L. Scott Allen asked him if he had anything he wanted to say. Tom got up in front of the assembly at Lake Junaluska, said a few words, and in closing said: "Now that I am retiring, I hope I get to hear preaching that's at least as good as I'm accustomed to." He brought down the house!

In 2002, at the age of 90, Tom was invited to preach at his first church's homecoming. He was able to stand and preach for an hour. Souls were saved. I was lucky enough to hear this wonderful sermon, which he preached on the tomb's still being empty.

Tom read his Bible, from cover to cover, 20 times in his lifetime, three of them on his knees. Once, when I was young, I tried to talk to my dad about something worldly. He changed the subject to Jesus Christ. Very disgusted, I told him that was all he ever thought about. He looked at me, smiled big, and said, "Thank you, son."

He went to heaven on January 3, 2006, in his sleep, after one week of illness. His funeral and burial took place at his beloved Liberty Church, at Hiddenite, where he had given his heart, his life, and his soul to Jesus Christ 87 years earlier. His body stayed that night, before his funeral, in the church.

Tom's message to everyone: "No matter what the cost, DO NOT MISS HEAVEN."

**CHARLES ADAMS RHINEHART**  
August 14, 1917 – May 22, 2005



Charles Adams Rhinehart was born on August 14, 1917, in Gastonia, North Carolina, of Lucy and Olus Rhinehart. His parents were devout Christians who instilled in him a resolute faith in Christ and a strong work ethic. Charles served in the Quartermaster Depot in Charlotte, North Carolina, during World War II. From there, he worked as a clerk in federal court in Mecklenburg County until accepting a call to full-time Christian ministry.

Charles carried his people skills with him and prepared academically for a life of service to Christ and his church. He attended Lees-McRae College; graduated from High Point College, now University (A.B., 1954); and completed the Course of Study School at Duke University Divinity School. Charles continued his studies at New York Theological Seminary and in London, England.

Charles married his childhood sweetheart, Helen Hipp, on March 7, 1941. During their 64 years of marriage, Helen was Charles' partner in ministry. To their union was born one son, David, on June 27, 1942.

Charles was licensed to preach in 1951 and began his ministry in the Thomasville District at Farmer (1951-54) and Pleasant Grove (1954-58). He was admitted on trial in the Western North Carolina

Conference in 1954, admitted in full connection and ordained deacon in 1956, and ordained elder in 1958. He moved in 1958 to the West Jefferson church, where he served until 1963. It was under his ministry at West Jefferson that this writer accepted the call to preach and Charles became his mentor. From West Jefferson, Charles moved to Madison, serving there until 1967, when he moved to Charlotte: St. James (1967-71). He then served the Tryon-Columbus charge from 1971 to 1976 and Mount Pleasant (Salisbury District) from 1976 to 1982, when he was granted retirement.

During 31 years of pastorates, Charles received a remarkable 235 persons on profession of faith and 310 by transfer of membership. This is such a testament to his preaching ability and his quest for additions to the kingdom.

Charles was in possession of a disarming wit, a ready smile, and a firm grasp of the right and needful approach to every circumstance. He maintained these admirable qualities until his physical death.

Charles retired first to Charlotte, North Carolina, where the family attended his home church, Pleasant Grove. There he taught Sunday School and was named *pastor emeritus*. His Sunday School class was also named in his honor. Later, Charles, Helen, and David lived in Casselberry, Florida, where they remained most active in The United Methodist Church. Charles' death came on May 22, 2005, at Winter Park, Florida, at age 87, as a result of a brain tumor. He was physically and mentally active until just a few days before his death. Memorial services were held at Pleasant Grove Church, Charlotte, on June 17, 2005. His body was interred in Forest Lawn Cemetery. Though his memory shall remain but for a season, his presence shall abide forever as God's gracious gift to humanity.

**McMURRY SMITH RICHEY**  
October 10, 1914 – October 22, 2005



McMurry Smith Richey, a conference member in full connection since 1943, died peacefully at his home in Durham, North Carolina, on October 22, 2005.

McMurry Smith (Mac) Richey was born October 10, 1914, in Marlin, Texas, and spent much of his early life around Brownsville, Texas, where he attended public schools and junior college (now the University of Texas at Brownsville and Texas Southmost College). From Duke University, he earned three degrees: A.B., in 1936; B.D. (now M.Div.), in 1939; and Ph.D., in 1954, all with honors (*Phi Beta Kappa* included).

In his senior B.D. year and after two years of courting and hitchhiking to Salem College, he married Erika Marx, daughter of Moravian missionaries to Tibet. Mac was licensed to preach in 1935; entered the Western North Carolina Conference of The Methodist Episcopal Church, South, on trial in 1939; admitted in full connection and ordained deacon in 1941; and ordained elder in 1943. He served pastorates until 1947 (Asheville: Central Associate, 1939-41; Cullowhee, 1941-45; Concord: Kerr Street, 1945-46; and Charlotte: Brevard Street, 1946-47). While in Cullowhee, he taught math at Western Carolina University, assisting an institution then suffering war-time faculty shortages. Returning to Texas, he was from 1947 to 1951 the director of Methodist student work, director of religious activities, and instructor in philosophy and religion at the University of Houston. From seminary on, in his early ministry, and, indeed throughout his career, Mac took strong stands on social, political, and economic issues. In these early years, he made prophetic and sometimes unpopular witness on race, war, and labor. For instance, speaking out for workers' interests and rights to organize in mill-owned Concord earned him a short appointment and a premature relocation.

Mac went back to Duke for the Ph.D. to study with H. Shelton Smith, under whom he completed a dissertation on theology and education, *Conceptions of Man in the Thought of George Albert Coe and William Clayton Bower*. During doctoral studies, he was named a Kearns Fellow in Religion and a Kent Fellow and became a member of the Society for Religion and Higher Education. Later memberships included the Religious Education Association, the American Academy of Religion, and the Association of Professors and Researchers in Religious Education.

Named to the faculty of The Divinity School after the Ph.D., he taught in the areas of theology, Wesley studies, and religious education, retiring in 1983 as professor of theology and Christian nurture. From 1972 on, he served as director of continuing education. In that role, and for some fifteen years, he organized, promoted, and led student and pastor study-seminars to Mexico. These carefully planned immersion events introduced participants to Third-World poverty, helped them understand how the United States is perceived, gave them an appreciation of Mexican history and culture, and opened dialogue with Mexican Methodism. Thereafter, Mac made conversations between the Mexican and the United States church and the interpretation of Latin American Christianity a centerpiece of his life and work.

In addition to administering the continuing education program, Richey directed the divinity school's annual convocation and pastors' school and staffed myriad committees. For a semester, he served as acting dean while Thomas A. Langford took a leave. A delegate to the Oxford Institute of Methodist Theological Studies, he participated in and contributed to many Methodist scholarly and professional endeavors on state, regional, and national levels.

Mac exercised a teaching ministry, had very pastoral relations with students, and put most of his scholarship into his courses. Former students recall his caring teaching, his personal interest in their development, his availability for counsel and guidance.

He published articles in various practical theological journals and Duke serials, especially in the areas of theology and education, and including discerning analyses of the contributions of his mentor, H. Shelton Smith. His scholarship also was invested in the writing of his colleagues, on a number of whose works he functioned as the silent, in-house editor. In this and in his selfless labor for the school and the ministry, he was a model colleague.

Mac Richey also invested significantly in the life of Trinity United Methodist Church, with which he and the family associated on the move to Durham in 1951. He and Erika were long-time members of the Trinitarian Class and both contributors to and recipients of the Trinitarian's remarkable ministry to one another.

Mac leaves his wife, Erika, and son, Douglas, both of the home; sons and daughters-in-law, Russell and Merle Richey and Thomas and Nancy Richey, of Atlanta; grandchildren, Russell and Kirby Richey, of Birmingham, Jonathan and Nikii Richey, of Memphis, William and Jennifer Richey, of Durham; and Elizabeth Richey, of Boston; great-grandchildren, Luke Richey, of Memphis, Benjamin Richey, of Durham, and Max and Hannah Thompson, of Birmingham; a brother and sister-in-law, Thomas and Barbara Richey, of Texas, and their children, Phil and Ilona Richey, of Alaska, and Leslie Jane Hirsch, of San Francisco; and several generations of Marx in-laws. In his family, Mac took great interest and pride and invested great love until his strength and consciousness failed him. Fittingly, wife Erika, son Doug, and grandson William were with him when he died.

A memorial service and interment were held at Trinity Church, Durham, with Duke Lackey and Susan White officiating and D. Moody Smith and Creighton B. Lacy, longtime colleagues and friends, offering tributes. Memorial gifts, in lieu of flowers, were invited to the McMurry S. Richey Endowment at Duke Divinity School.

**DONALD EDWARD ROLLINS**  
**July 15, 1928 – February 18, 2006**



Donald Edward Rollins was born into the Methodist parsonage and lived there all his life, except while in school and in retirement. His parents were Reverend William A. and Mary Cline Rollins, and his father served as a pastor, district superintendent, and conference director of evangelism. To know Christ and to make Him known was always his primary goal.

Don was the fourth of six children—three boys and three girls. They were living in Greensboro, serving at College Place Church, when Don was born. All the boys are now deceased, but three beloved sisters survive: Jean, Nell, and Thelma. In 1944, the Rollins family moved to Lexington, North Carolina, where Don graduated from high school in 1945. He then attended Wofford College and graduated from High Point College, now University, in 1949 with a

B.A. degree. He married Sue Leonard, of Lexington, on August 27, 1950, and continued his education at Duke University, where he received his master of divinity degree in 1955. He would later earn his doctor of ministry degree at Southeastern Baptist Theological Seminary, in Wake Forest, in 1982.

Having joined Hickory: First in 1939 and educated himself to be an ordained Methodist minister, Don was admitted on trial in the Western North Carolina Conference in 1953. He was admitted in full connection and ordained deacon in 1955 and ordained elder in 1956. For 40 years, he and Sue served together in the following appointments: Student, Duke, 1953-55; Harrison, 1955; New Hope-Bethel (Charlotte District), 1955-59; Monroe: North-Benton Heights, 1959-61; Pine Grove-Clemmons, 1961-65; Sulphur Springs, 1965-66; Norwood, 1966-68; Concord: Kerr Street, 1968-71; May's Chapel-St. Paul's, 1971-73; Monticello-Midway, 1973-78; Williamson's Chapel, 1978-82; Gay's Chapel, 1982-86; Charlotte: St. John's, 1986-89; Troutman: First-St. John's, 1989-90; and Pisgah (Gastonia District), 1990-92.

Don was granted retirement in 1992, and he and Sue returned to their home in Lexington, where Don was involved in the ministry of First United Methodist Church. He served as a teacher, friend, and on various committees until illness confined him to their home. Sue continued in service to all and comforted and cared for Don until his death on February 18, 2006, at Wake Forest University Baptist Medical Center, Winston-Salem.

Their three cherished children and a granddaughter survive: Donald Edward, Jr., born on January 18, 1960; Edna Valerie (Goforth), born on May 15, 1963; William Leo, born on October 27, 1964; and their granddaughter, Jennifer Nichole Goforth, born on August 5, 1985, who lovingly called him "Pop."

When we think of Don, one word of character springs immediately to mind: He was a man of loyalty. It was a loyalty that extended to his God, the churches he served, his family, and his friends. That sense of loyalty enabled everyone to be able to count on his friendship. When he was ordained and promised to go where he was sent, he went. When you became his friend, you knew that you could count on his support through thick and thin. He was always there for people when they needed his support.

Don was a minister who sought to bring out the best in the congregations he served. He felt that no one should ever stop learning. This was part of the vows he took to go on to perfection, as Wesley would put it. He provided a great example through his own life. He often attended conferences to seek new points of view and to become acquainted with different forms of ministry. Well into his ministry, he acquired his doctor of ministry degree in small-group ministry as a means of providing another opportunity to assist his congregations to grow in faith. He sought to tie together growth in community, with its emphasis on sharing each other's faith and point of view, with a growth of knowledge, emphasizing a deeper biblical and doctrinal understanding, both of which will enable us to live more fully.

Sue and Don loved their little mountain cabin at Gingercake, where they could hike and take in the beautiful scenery all around them. They enjoyed being hosts to small groups from the church and to longtime friends who loved mountains as they did. Their get-away cabin provided opportunities to enjoy family time and to strengthen relationships among friends.

Don had two special interests outside of church life. He loved working as a ham operator, using his acquired skill with ham-radio clubs, like the Rowan and Healing Spring Mountain Amateur Radio clubs. They enjoyed helping their communities provide communications in emergencies and times of crisis. They liked to help communities provide logistics during community celebration events.

The other special interest was playing golf. It was one way to keep up with friends. He played with one set of golfers from Salisbury regularly. We know that Don worked on his game of golf much as he tried to do with all of life; that is, to improve each day. Surely, that is what all of us are called to do.

A memorial service was held for Don at First Church, Lexington, on February 22, 2006, followed by burial at Forest Hill Memorial Park, Lexington.
